

# Searching my family history

Some time ago, I cannot remember when exactly, I decided to research my family history, in the hopes, maybe, of finding a rich uncle, or a notorious villain from the past. However, so far all I have found is ordinary people living ordinary lives. It is surprising the number of resources available to delve into to search for that missing rich uncle, or villainous murderer from the past, but the most useful locally is the Family History Society. Its present accommodation is in Every Street in the Town Hall Square and has available software on computers for use by members along with various documents from the towns and villages in Leicestershire. The two most useful resources are Ancestry.com and Find My Past, both commercial organisations one would normally have to pay for to gain access but are readerly available for members of the society.

It was not until the 1<sup>st</sup> July 1837 that civil registration began, and all births, deaths, and marriages were recorded. Before that date parish records are the main source of information, but they are not always very informative. For those families who have been freemen for many generations there are also the freemen's registers which can be found in the reference library in Bishop Street, but unfortunately my own family is recently admitted to the freemen clan. My great-great grandfather, William Tolton, had four sons and five daughters, and the eldest daughter, Elizabeth, married Joseph Warburton, a freeman, in 1850. Joseph was a clay pipe maker by trade, and he took on Elizabeth's younger brother, also named William, as an apprentice, and on completing his apprenticeship when he reached 21 years of age, he too became a freeman. So, my great grandfather, William (the younger) was the first in line of a sequence of Tolton's to become freemen. Incidentally, as far as I am aware, he is the earliest member of my family to be photographed.

William Tolton (the elder) married Catherine Pole on the 19<sup>th</sup> November 1826 on the same day and time that his brother, Hanameel Tolton married Ann Pole, Catherine's sister, at St Margarets Church. Sadly, Ann died one year later giving birth to her first child, who also did not survive. Two brothers marrying two sisters on the same day must have been a happy family occasion only to be snatched away a short time later. However, both brothers lived long and fruitful lives, William producing nine surviving children and Hanameel six.

Researching my family history was not just about the Tolton family, I also researched my mother's family. My maternal Grandfather, Robert Patchett was born on the 21<sup>st</sup> November 1879 in a cottage in the Wagon and Horses Yard next door to Thomas Cooke's Temperance Hotel in Granby Street to William and Harriet Patchitt. Judging by the nature of the accommodation they were in financial difficulties. Robert's brothers and other family members were living comfortable lives in Redmile in northeast Leicestershire. At 16 he joined the army in the Leicester Regiment claiming to be 18, and in 1898 was posted to South Africa to take part in the Boer War.

The campaign bars on the Queen Victoria Medal are Belfast, Laing's Nek, Defence of Ladysmith and Talana, and on the Edward VII Medal the bars are for South Africa 1901 and for South Africa 1902 campaigns.

After the Boer War he came back to Leicester and on the 12<sup>th</sup> June 1907 married my grandmother, Annie Wardle.

When war was declared in 1914, he enlisted in the Garison Artillery and was killed in France on the 12<sup>th</sup> June 1917 and is buried at Henin-sur-Cojeul.

At the beginning of this article I did mention the Family History Society, the local branch of the Federation of Family History Societies. Four times a year they publish an A5 size journal, very much like the Gildhall News, but with a notable difference. The last Leicestershire Family History Society journal consisted of 80 pages of information, quite a lot of which is contributions by members, whereas the last Gildhall News consisted of 20 pages. Someone out there must have something interesting to say.

# Kind regards from Germany

Ask a Leicester local about the city's connection to Germany and many would think of Leicester's twin city, Krefeld, which has been twinned with Leicester since 1969.

But recently a new link between Leicester and Germany has been made, in particular with the Leicester Gild of Freeman. Situated between the industrial city of Stuttgart and the hills of the Swabian Alb lies "Esslingen am Neckar". Known for its cobbled streets, timbered houses and underground tunnels linking the town's former monastery to Germany's oldest champagne cellar, Esslingen am Neckar is a pretty town, home to around 95,000 people.

Anyone considering visiting Esslingen am Neckar might enjoy its summer wine festival where local wine and delicacies are enjoyed on the market place at the foot of the hillside castle. Its medieval Christmas Market with flame lit torches

and vendors dressed in medieval attire tempting visitors with mulled wine and sausages is arguably Esslingen's most famous tourist attraction.

So you may now be wondering what the connection to Leicester is? Jake Bickelmann-Esser lives in Esslingen and was delighted to have reconnected with his Leicester roots by being made free in a Hereditary Freemen Ceremony held in Leicester Town Hall on 20<sup>th</sup> May 2025. Friends in Germany have shown great interest in the historic community of Freemen and Jake has enjoyed sharing his knowledge of the history of Leicester's Freemenship with them.

Recent activities by other Guilds and Courts Leet in the South Midlands Area include:

#### **Coventry Freemen's Guild**

A Past Master's Dinner was held on the 16<sup>th</sup> March – a welcome return of an annual event stopped by the Covid pandemic. Bob Crane received a Meritorious Service Certificate to recognise his long service as the Guild's Liaison Officer with Coventry's affiliated navy ships of HMS Coventry and HMS Diamond – both granted the Freedom of Coventry, with the ship's companies marching through the City with colours flying, drums beating, and bayonets fixed. The Guild's annual dinner took place on Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> May, with a robed parade to the Guild Church for the 'Freemen's Sunday' service. A Guild publicity leaflet is now available, to encourage eligible people to become Freemen, and join the Guild.

#### Northampton Freemen's Guild

Rules for the Admittance to the Freedom by apprenticeship are now available, summarised here as three years of training, as prescribed by trade or profession, with an oversight by the Freemen's Trustee committee. Location will need to be within a five mile radius of the Guildhall, and with a requirement to attend some Trustee meetings. This is a welcome move to ensure the continuation of the Northampton Freemen.

### **Henley-in-Arden Court Leet**

Usual annual events of the Court Leet dinner and 'Court Leet Day' Assizes and artisans market have taken place, plus a 'Beating the Bounds' walk around the town, which stretches back to medieval times.

#### **Warwick Court Leet**

The February Beer Festival at the medieval Lord Leycester Hospital raised nearly £8000 to support preservation of this timber framed medieval structure — a great effort by all involved, and thanks to Town Sponsors for their help. Next big event is the July 11<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup> Summer Beer festival at Warwick Racecourse, with a good range of beers, ciders, food - and music too: to raise monies for the Town's deserving causes in postcode CV 34.

# The Freemen of Leicester — A Short History


As mentioned in Lynn Roffee's report, you will be able to purchase a copy of this new book from the office on or after 18<sup>th</sup> August.
